Integrating ethnographic and linguistic research in and around two schools during the last phase of the

war, Davis's research shows how, despite the intention of the reforms, practices on the ground reinforce language-based models of ethnicity and sustain ethnic divisions and power inequalities. By engaging with the actual experiences of Tamil and Muslim youth, Davis demonstrates the difficulties of using language policy to ameliorate ethnic conflict if it does not also address how that conflict is produced and reproduced in everyday talk.

global modernities, defined as language ideological projects in which migrants objectify dimensions of time and space through scalar metaphors.
